


## Location


A disused sandstone quarry situated south of the lane from Bubbenhall to Stoneleigh. The quarry, is fairly heavily overgrown but some faces are still valuable. Perhaps c.40% exposure. The site is next to the Centenary Way long distance footpath and can be viewed from this public right-of-way. To enter the site, however, prior permission is required. Owners request minimum publicity.

## **Summary of Interest**

This site exposes up to 4.5m of massive buff sandstone belonging to the Triassic, Sherwood Sandstone Group, Bromsgrove Sandstone Formation and it displays well developed current bedding. The sedimentary structures are of sufficient quality to be of value at all educational levels.
